And this should be a part of their curriculum. Each new generation of children and teenagers face many health challenges. - 3. Sustainable finance;
- 4. Support for pilot projects/programs and their conversion to regular programs as soon as they prove successful;
- 5. Involvement of health authorities at national, state and district levels;
- 6. Government-Commitment is necessary;
- 7. A Global Fund for Continuing Medical Education (CME);
- 8. Improving the accessibility for girls, women and minorities to STEMM programs.

WHEC supports capacity building for e-Health and e-Government applications worldwide, and look forward to developing the use of norms and standards, with the World Health Organization (WHO). We aim to reach, Least Developed Countries (LDCs) identified by United Nations Development Fund (UNDP), to disseminate *Reproductive Health Research* and evidence-based information. WHEC provides, free-access to online e-Learning / e-Health, to LDCs. Our **LINK** (Learning, Innovating, Network for Knowledge) **Access Project**, encourages national health and educational systems to contribute, towards continued education at all levels, to improve maternal and child health, culturally appropriate contraception counseling information and availability; Prevention of Teen Pregnancies, End Child Marriages, and Violence against Women and Children.

By interacting with different cultures, we will learn to respect diversity. Building the capacity to care, is a global responsibility. And it is our generation's responsibility and our opportunity.
