Why?

Even before the pandemic, the world was not on track to achieve Sustainable Development Goals by 2030 – for school enrollment, literacy programs, providing healthcare services to its people. This pandemic, has been the single largest disruption to education systems and healthcare services. The World Bank estimates that, students currently in school, stand to lose, a cumulative of \$17 trillion, in lost-labor-earnings, over their work-life, due to school closures. Some estimates suggest that COVID-19 has wiped out 20 years of gains, with SDGs 3, 4, 5. Many children also suffer from mental health issues, due to increasing isolation.

These negative impacts have disproportionately affected vulnerable communities, including developing countries, low-income households, women, girls, persons with disabilities, migrants, and refugees.

Here is the brief history of this initiative and our journey. In collaboration with the Department of Public Information (DPI) of the United Nations and the WHO; this e-Health Platform, was launched on 24 October 2002, for healthcare providers, for exchanging their experiences, research, and to disseminate evidence-based reproductive health information, with the world.

In 2006, WHEC began developing scientifically based practice guidelines – Practice Bulletins. The guidelines are derived, from the best available evidence-based evidence, published in literature, its clinical efficacy and consideration of costs, with recommendations clearly, linked to the evidence. These evidence-based practice guidelines are intended, to be a means of improving the quality of healthcare, decreasing its cost, and diminishing professional liability. They are prospective in nature, therefore directive in approach.

Our physician's Board identifies, evaluates, and synthesizes the evidence-base information, from the medical literature to produce these practice guidelines. It is provided to serve as a readily available introduction to, and overview of the topic.

In 2013, WHEC Global Health Line (WGHL) was launched in collaboration with, the Division of Reproductive Health Research (RHR) of the WHO, on July 4, 2013. This global health line is, an <u>Internet Facing Collaboration Platform</u>, hosted by WHEC, in the United States of America (USA). Women die in the prime of life, during the pregnancy and childbirth, about half a million women, still in 2022, and 90% of these tragedies are in LDCs. Maternal mortality is not an academic subject of numbers and words; it is about people in deep distress. Women should be provided with access to community-based maternity services during pregnancy, as well as, during and after delivery. Immediate and effective professional care during and after labor and delivery can make a life-and-death difference, for mothers and their newborn children.
