WHO Academy is an excellent initiative, which is based in Lyon, France and was launched in 2019 when Government of France, French President Mr. Macron pledged US\$ 100 million, (in Euro 90 million) to WHO, for the purposes of revolutionizing life-long learning in health. WHEC's collaboration with WHO Academy will bring together adult learning science, behavioral science and cutting-edge learning technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI) and virtual reality with WHO's norms, standards and evidence to deliver, high-impact accredited and tailored multilingual learning, to meet needs of 7 billion people of the world. WHEC is looking forward to develop strong collaboration with all the WHO Member States; and make this initiative a success.

Proceeding in this way, that not only strengthens capacity, but also preserves cultural integrity and increases the access to such technologies, for those who need it most, must remain the goal.

It is the poor and marginalized in our society and in our world, that have the most to gain from advances in healthcare and e-Health; sadly – at this point, they are often the groups, who benefit the least.

Government Commitment is Necessary – Long-term government commitment, based on a strategic plan is a pre-requisite for the successful implementation, of Internet Classrooms in Health and Education, in every country – rich and poor alike. This commitment may be in the form of:

- 1. A long-term plan that is binding on all parties at all times;
- 2. Sustainable finance;
- 3. Support for pilot projects/programs and their conversion to regular programs as soon as they prove successful;
- 4. Involvement of health authorities at national, state and district levels.
