## Statement

Creating a Level Playing Field for Girls and Women in Technology: Our Efforts

Women's Health and Education Center aims to optimize opportunities for girls, women and minorities in the science and technology sector through enhanced professional capacity and mentorship and by leveraging the power of international cooperation. In a bid to build a more gender-balanced society where girls and women are provided with the same opportunities and resources to excel as their male counterparts, the workshop proceedings and discussions gathered here detailed information on the experiences of women in the technology sector and their recommendations on the areas in need of support and intervention.

The objective of this written statement is to elaborate strategies that will strengthen national policies in education and health. The teaching and healthcare delivery components of national education sector and health sector plans are also discussed.

Women's unique strength in scientific research and social development should be fully emphasized. In the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic, women scientists and women medical workers have made efforts and contributions, which profoundly reflect the power of women.
